Since your last meeting on the 19th May 2008 there has been one reported crimes for Great Bealings.

1. Theft from motor vehicle – bag containing dog biscuits and dog lead stolen from within a insecure vehicle on driveway

BURGLARIES

With lighter evenings we like to remind you to keep windows and conservatories shut when leaving your homes as we have seen a slight increase in burglaries within some of the surrounding villages. I would ask that you still remain vigilant and advise you to ensure your houses and outbuildings are kept secure at all times.

Outside Lighting - analysis has shown that offenders don't like to commit crime when in the spotlight. Unlike the movement sensor security lights the dusk to dawn is on permanently throughout the evening/night and hopefully deterring any potential offenders, these can be purchased from most DIY stores.

Timer switches can be used in the house to ensure a light comes on and goes off at a time set by yourselves when you are away from the premises. The idea of this suggests someone is at home, always good when you're on holiday!!! Again these can be purchased from most DIY stores.

Shed alarms are becoming more popular and can be purchased at most Suffolk Constabulary police stations.

Please remember to remove any personal items from your front gardens as items on show like bicycles, prams, garden heaters etc attract offenders into your neighbourhood.

THEFT FROM MOTOR VEHICLES

Unfortunately this continues to be a big problem and I can only advise as always to take valuables out of your cars and ensure they are secure at all times, even when parked on your own driveways.

During the spring months we always see an increase in Theft From Motor Vehicles, particularly in rural locations where walkers leave their vehicles unattended for a few hours at the roadside or rural car parks.

Please ensure that your vehicle is kept secure at all times and valuables are not left on display, preferably they should be removed from the vehicle altogether. Items such as Sat Nav's, mobile phones, handbags etc....

THEFT FROM GARDENS

Of late, there has been an increase of theft of domestic oil from storage tanks in gardens and within grounds of other properties. Two such offences have occurred recently within our SNT area. The suspects would have to use a larger type of vehicle to convey the stolen oil away. We want anyone with information to contact the Team or contact CrimeStoppers free on 0800 555 111. If you see anyone acting suspiciously on any premises dial 999.

Stray Dogs - New Regulations

New national regulations, which come into force on 6th April 2008, will mean that Suffolk Constabulary will no longer be able to take in stray dogs at any police stations. Section 68 of the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005, removes the power of the police to seize or receive stray dogs handed in by the public. The responsibility for dealing with stray dogs will rest solely with the local authorities. Mike Shields, Superintendent at Suffolk Police, said: "Currently, when someone has lost or found a dog the information is collated by the police and the local authorities. With the introduction of the new regulations, all cases of lost or found dogs should be reported to the local authority only. "This should make it easier for the public with only one point of contact and will increase the chances of owners being reunited with their dogs and will also free up staff within police stations to deal with other duties." Suffolk Police will still be responsible for taking reports of criminal offences to do with dogs and for investigating these. These include dangerous dogs, dogs worrying livestock, and theft of dogs. Where necessary the police will still have powers to seize dogs for such offences.
